1. Portable Document Format (pdf): The documents contained in these 27 zip files are stored as Adobe Acrobat portable document format (pdf) files. The pdf files are designed to present documents in the same format and appearance across most computer hardware and software platforms. The pdf files allow numerous enhancements to printed documents such as hyper-linking and zooming, while maintaining the layout and appearance of the printed documents.

2. Acrobat Reader: The user's computer must contain a software package capable of opening a pdf file before it can be viewed. The most common software package for viewing pdf files is Adobe's Acrobat Reader, which is available and distributable free of charge from Adobe Systems for a variety of operating systems. The software is available for download from <http://www.adobe.com>.

3. Acrobat Reader Versions: Acrobat Reader has been available for several years and has gone through several versions. The pdf file documents in these zip files were created using Acrobat 4.0 with Search. However, they are fully compatible with Version 2.1 and later.

4. Acrobat Reader with Search: Acrobat Reader is available with or without the search function. Acrobat Reader software allows the user to open and view pdf files. The Acrobat Reader with Search version of the software accesses user-created index files for querying data. In addition to simply opening and viewing pdf files, Acrobat Reader with Search software enables the user to take advantage of the index file found in the second zip file called "sag-2.zip". *(Note - The index file built for this document collection is only functional on Windows operating systems).*

- *Find:* You can search for text within a single pdf file by clicking on the binocular icon.
- *Search:* The Acrobat Search command allows you to perform full-text searches of the entire document collection (multiple pdf files). After you click on the Search icon, the "Adobe Acrobat Search" dialog box appears. Click on the "Indexes" button to make sure the Acrobat Reader can find the index for this document collection. Accessing the document collection by opening the "coverlet.pdf" file (see 10. Getting Started: Opening the document in Acrobat), will insure the index will be found without having to load it manually using the "Indexes" button. The index for this document collection is called SagIndex.pdx and is located in the second zip file called "sag-2.zip".

5. Acrobat Reader versus Adobe Acrobat: There is a difference between Adobe Acrobat Reader and Adobe Acrobat. Acrobat Reader is the free software that facilitates basic viewing, navigating, and printing of pdf files. Adobe Acrobat is a more extensive software package made up of components including Distiller, Exchange, Catalog, and Reader. Adobe Acrobat enables the user to convert from other file formats, edit and enhance files, and build indexes for pdf files. Adobe Acrobat is not free; it is available for various

operating systems from Adobe Systems Inc.

6. Installing Acrobat Reader: The methods for installing Acrobat Reader are straight forward, but vary slightly depending on computer platforms and operating systems.

7. Acrobat Reader Distribution and Licensing: The following information is taken from the Adobe Web site, <http://www.adobe.com/prodindex/acrobat/distribute.html>. "You can distribute the free Adobe(R) Acrobat(R) Reader software to anyone - inside or outside your company - who needs to view, navigate, and search PDF files. You may make unlimited copies of the Acrobat Reader 3.0 software and give copies to other persons or entities as long as the copies contain the Electronic End-User License Agreement and the same copyright and other proprietary notices that appear on or in the software. The license agreement, copyright notices, and other notices are contained in the Acrobat Reader installer program; so as long as you do not alter the installer program in any way you will be in compliance with the agreement."

8. Compression software: The user's computer must contain a software package capable of uncompressing a zip file. The most common software package for uncompressing zip files on Windows operating systems is WinZip. WinZip software is available for download free of charge from <http://www.winzip.com>. For those working on a Macintosh, Linnux, or Solaris operating system, Stuffit Expander software is available for download free of charge from <http://www.stuffit.com/expander>. Unix users should uncompress the zip files on one of the operating systems listed above.

9. Getting Started: Uncompressing zip files: All downloaded zip files should be uncompressed in the same directory. Doing so will retain the relative file structure needed to utilize the search index and bookmarks. For more information, see 12. Portability of data. (*Note - The index file built for this document collection is only functional on Windows operating systems*).

10. Getting Started: Opening the document in Acrobat: Double-click on the "coverlet.pdf" file located in the "SagSdeis" directory. Acrobat will open automatically, displaying the SDEIS Evaluation cover letter in the right hand side of the view window and 3 bookmarks in the left hand side of the view window. Click on these bookmarks to access the SDEIS Evaluation Summary, the main body of the SAG Effects Analysis for the SDEIS Alternatives document, or to return to the SDEIS Evaluation cover letter at a later time. Even if all 27 zip files have not been downloaded and uncompressed into their relative file structure, individual pdfs within each of the zip files can still be viewed. Simply double-click on each pdf file to view it independently.

11. Navigating the document in Acrobat: There are 5 ways to navigate this document:

- Click on bookmarks.
- Click on the arrows located on the tool bar.
- Click on the rectangular, melon colored "Return" buttons found primarily on the map and figure pages.
- Click on the binocular icon to search for text within a single pdf file.
- Use the search option from the Edit pull-down menu to search for text within an entire pdf document collection (multiple pdf files).

12. Portability of data: The individual pdf files contained in these 27 zip files can be freely copied and used. However, for the Acrobat index and Acrobat bookmarks to function properly, all files must remain in the same relative file structure and use the same naming conventions that were created when the zip files were uncompressed. Therefore, in order to copy pdf files and retain use of the index and bookmarks provided, the files must be copied into a file structure beginning with a directory called "SagSdeis". The index files and folders within the "SagSdeis" directory must also retain the same relative file structure and naming conventions. (*Note - The index file built for this document collection is only functional on Windows operating systems*).
